
#### **How She Got Started**

When Hailey was 4 years old, her grandma (whom Hailey calls her best friend) was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease. After the diagnosis, Hailey's mom, Emma Richman, reached out to the founder of Puzzles to Remember, a charity that gives jigsaw puzzles to nursing homes, veterans institutions and other facilities that care for dementia patients, to ask how her family could get involved. Hailey soon became passionate about delivering and completing puzzles with the residents at her grandma's nursing home. Later that year, Hailey was named the

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honorary assistant director of the organization and, four years later, the "honorary" was dropped. She also donates her allowance and provides puzzles for her classmates to take to other elder care residences.



#### **Her Passion Grew**

Hailey's experiences at the nursing home inspired her to start an online support group for kids helping a sick family member. On Kidcaregivers.com, Hailey, with her mom's supervision, answers questions and writes about her family's experience with Alzheimer's. The site has reached kids from every continent (except Antarctica). What is Hailey's most important message to other kids? They're not alone.

#### Her Advice To Other Kids

A nursing home can be a scary place for children, so Hailey reminds them that their job is to help loved ones feel calm and happy. "Go into their world," she says. For example, some of the residents think Hailey and her friends are their grandchildren, and the kids happily play along!
